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## The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)

On January 31, 2020, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Alex M. Azar II declared a public health emergency (PHE) for the United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to COVID-19.

The <u>Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services</u> has provided information and updates about the coronavirus, including

- general information & updates.
- coverage and payment related to COVID-19,
- clinical & technical guidance,
- billing & coding guidance, and
- survey & certification guidance.

In addition, the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services has published a <u>COVID-19 Emergency Declaration</u> <u>Health Care Providers Fact Sheet</u> and an <u>FAQs sheet with guidance and considerations for Patient Triage</u>, <u>Placement and Hospital Discharge</u> concerning Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19).
